



Before children start to write independently we can structure sentences for them. This worksheet uses words they can read but they now need to rearrange them into something that makes sense. There are two levels A (CVC words) and B (CCVC and sh words). Try both if you wish or choose the most appropriate.

Letter Formation

Either use the worksheet for j-r sounds or write the sounds out using a sensory approach. Take a small shallow tray and put a layer of something like lentils, oats, salt, glitter, sand or flour in it. Use different things to 'write' in the tray with eg. cotton bud, stick, paint brush


Rainy Day Rabbit - Talk 4 Writing

Number Formation	<p>Continue to use the number formation rhymes and handwriting sheets to practice writing numbers correctly. 10-15 minutes every day would be good!</p> <p>Choose different tools and methods to write with to keep it interesting. This week have a go at 'Guess my Number'. You can play this game with an adult at home or a sibling. Practice writing different numbers on someone's back. Can they guess what number you have written? Ask them to draw numbers on your back, can you guess correctly?</p>		
Numbers, Numbers, Numbers!	<p><u>Roll & Race Missing Numbers</u></p> <p>Roll a dice to find out which row you need to select a sequence from. Can you identify the first number in the sequence? Do you know what the missing number is?</p> <p><u>Bump!</u> Numbers to 10 and 20</p> <p>Who can place all of their counters on the board first? Pick a card and read out the number sequence; do you know what number is missing? If you can identify the missing number, find it on the board and cover it with a counter. If not, put the card back in the pile and try again next time.</p>	<p><u>It's a Mystery</u></p> <p>Someone has been playing around with my number squares. They have placed stickers and pictures over some of the numbers and now I can't count properly as I don't know what the missing numbers are. Number Bonds

Monday Video

For these activities you will need a pack of playing cards. Don't worry if you don't have a set of cards you can use the cards provided in the files section. These games can also be played for number bonds to 10 and 20.

Memory Game

Get someone to pair up the cards that make ten (or 20) e.g. 8 and 2, 6 and 4 (18 and 2, 14 and 6). When they have been sorted, shuffle the cards and place them face down randomly on the floor or table. Take it in turns to turn over two cards and try and make 10. If you are successful you get to keep the cards and have another go.

Make 10 or 20

To start, get someone to pair up all the cards that make ten (or 20) e.g. 8 and 2, 6 and 4 (18 and 2, 14 and 6). When they have been sorted, shuffle the cards and deal each player 7 cards and place the extras face down in the middle. If you have any 2 cards that make 10 (or 20) put them to the side. Each player then takes a card from the middle of the pile to add to their hand to try and make 10 (20). If you can't make a 10 (20) you keep the card and get rid of one to the centre pile. Continue taking turns until someone has paired up all their cards or no-one can play. The person with the most pairs wins.

How many More?

Using ten frames / twenty frames children need to work out how many boxes have been filled in, before working out how many more are needed to make the target number.

Number Bonds to 10

In this worksheet children are provided with different question types to help reinforce their number bond to 10 knowledge.

Number Bonds to 20

Once children feel confident with their number bonds to 10 they can have a go at using their addition knowledge to help them learn number bonds to 20. Again this worksheet provided them with a range of different question types to help build knowledge and understanding.

Museum of Tens

This game organises the exhibits in groups of five, similar to a ten frame so hopefully makes it easier to identify how many more are needed.

Data Handling (Tally Marks)

Wednesday Video

On a Roll

For this activity you will need a game board, two dice and some counters. This activity can be played in different ways.

4 in a row:

Roll two dice and add the numbers together. Find the box showing the matching number of tally marks and cover it with a counter. If the number isn't there or has already been covered miss a turn.

The winner is the first person to have 4 counters in a row.

Bingo:

Using small scrap pieces of paper write the numbers 1-12. Crumple them up and place them in a bowl or box. Take it in turns to pull out and read aloud the number. Find and cover the matching tally marks on the board. First person to cover four in a row gets to shout BINGO!

Count and Tally

A selection of activities to give children practice of counting and writing tally marks with different quantities within 10 and 20.

When counting tally marks above 5 or 10 try and encourage your child to recognise the 5 or 10 tally marks and count on from there, rather than counting every line.

For an added challenge the extension set of worksheets gives children the opportunity to begin to use the information in tally tables to answer questions.

Watch Out!

This is a great game for all the family to enjoy. It reinforces tally mark value recognition and being able to read information from bar graphs.

You can print and use the tally mark dice provided or write tally mark values up to 6 on scrap pieces of paper and pick them out each time to find out how many spaces to move.

As you move around the board you are trying to avoid the icicles with snowballs. If you land on one of those spaces you need to pick up a card. These cards then tell you how many spaces you have to move back.

Who can make it all the way to the hot chocolate?

1. Warm up Game

Clap, Clap, Clap Your Hands
